15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The New Education Policy, 2020 envisions structural changes while introducing a holistic and multidisciplinary curriculum that has the potential to transform both the learning environment and the learning process for students in the higher education institutions. The College being autonomous has adopted the NEP 2020 guidelines with regard to curriculum for implementing the multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary structure of the New Education Policy. The following initiatives have been taken by the institution. 'Open Elective Courses' consisting of 10-12 credits in the overall programme credit structure has been offered to the UG I and II students. A student of Arts faculty can opt a course from Commerce and Science and vice versa. The college being a Kannada Linguistic Minority Institute has offered 'Kannada' subject under Open Elective and Minor credit structure Skill Enhancement Courses are designed from interdisciplinary approach according to UGC LOCF guidelines. Under Ability Enhancement Course, 'English for all' L1 and Hindi/Marathi L2 are made mandatory courses for the students of all programmes of UGI and UGII. IKS Courses have been framed with a multidisciplinary approach. Minor subjects are designed by the department from different disciplines. For VEC "Democracy, Elections, and Good Governance" course and Environment Studies are included in the credit structure with an interdisciplinary approach. Further, the College promotes interdisciplinary activities by hosting special lectures, quizzes, science fairs, marketing expos and other events on themes that have cross disciplines.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Preliminary discussions were held during the academic year 2021-2022 to give suggestions for planning and simplifying the activities for the implementation of NEP 2020. Establishment of ABC committee to carry out various tasks was the first move in this direction. The Committee members also managed the task of connecting the college students to the ABC platform using a Digilocker framework. Faculties participated in online sessions pertaining to the development of Academic Bank of Credits. Videos about the Academic Bank of Credits registration procedure were developed by the college which was disseminated through via student diaries, student WhatsApp groups, etc. 4955 students have generated their ABC ID.

17.Skill development:

The Outcome Based Education paradigm, which emphasizes skill development and learning outcomes, serves as the foundation for the curriculum and syllabus. According to UGC's LOCF guidelines, skill courses should be added to the credit structure. As a result, courses are created to help students build discipline-specific abilities. Furthermore, skill development through VSC and SEC has been given increased priority in NEP 2020 guidelines. While developing SEC courses that focus on skill development and VSC pertinent to major courses that are required, the proper course level of the UGC recommendations is taken into account. Likewise, department-created forums give students a chance to develop and hone their soft skills and leadership abilities. It is where students have deep conversations, debates, and other activities that help them improve both personally and professionally.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The college has incorporated the Indian Knowledge system into the curriculum. IKS Courses IKS courses like Chanakya Philosophies for Management, Vedic Mathematics, Bharat Varsha, Brahmi Lipi and Mahatma Basveshwar's Social Thoughts have been incorporated into the curriculum by the departments. Encouragement of Indian Languages: The College has always prioritized the promotion and preservation of Indian languages. Literacy associations celebrate Hindi Diwas, Marathi Rajbhasha Din, etc and support and honour the value of Indian languages. Promotion of Indian customs, festivals, and culture: The spirit of Indian culture is brought forth by occasions like the Gurupournima celebration, Ganeshotsav, exhibition held on the eve of Raksha Bandan: The Festival of Sacred Threads, Bondla held at the girls' hostel during Navratra, etc. The college aims to keep up these efforts to integrate Indian culture and old Indian knowledge in order to give students an awareness of cultural immersion and cultivate a profound respect for Indian customs.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The goal of outcome-based education is to establish clear learning objectives and evaluate students' performance in relation to those objectives. In order to achieve OBE, the college has taken efforts to offer a superior combination of theory and experience-based, practical knowledge. Further to ensure the successful implementation of OBE and to instill the spirit of NEP 2020 among the teachers, the IQAC of the college had organized a workshop for teachers on "Writing COs, Mapping, and Attainment." Framing COs and POs has been made possible. Through activities, projects, case studies, events, and industry visits, students are given the chance to apply their academic knowledge to real-life circumstances.

20.Distance education/online education:

With a focus on the institute's mission to spread education in general and to teach in any field of knowledge wherever and whenever possible, the highly motivated faculty members promote learning using online learning environments and the Chalk and Talk system, . A Wi-Fi enabled campus, broadband internet access, LAN system, lecture halls with LCD projectors, smart classrooms with interactive whiteboards, and projection display aids for online learning are all part of the college's ICT infrastructure, which has made it possible for technology-driven teaching-learning practices across all programmes. The faculty members host virtual lectures using a range of online learning platforms, including Google Meet, Zoom, Microsoft Teams, and others. After realizing the benefits of online education, the college took the decision to keep using digital platforms to provide online instruction. This method enabled the students, irrespective of their geographical location, to obtain extra assistance and make up lost learning opportunities. The college encourages students to sign up for courses like SWAYAM and NPTEL. A workshop on awareness of NPTEL courses has also been organized by the college.

1.1 - Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 - Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs which are reflected in Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the various Programmes offered by the Institution.

Following the State Government's directions for all Autonomous Colleges to implement NEP2020 commencing in June 2023, the college introduced the NEP2020 syllabus for UG and PG First Year students in the academic year 2023-2024. Verticals such as majors, minors, open electives, ability enhancement courses, skill enhancement courses, IKS, VEC, and CC curricula are all included in the NEP2020 syllabus. The program also includes field work, internships, student projects, and practical experiments as creditable components. The NEP curriculum structure also covers environmental studies, democratic principles, and fitness and health. The syllabus for the aforementioned courses had been approved by BOS in July 2023 and at the eight AC (20/07/2023) and eight GB (27/07/2023) meetings.

B. A. Civil Service third year, MA II having specialization in Geography and M. Com. with Costing specialization were introduced in the academic year 2023-24. courses. The syllabus of the same were discussed, drafted and approved in the BOS meeting with further approval recommendations from Academic Council and General Body.

- Students who take science and technology courses develop a scientific temperament in addition to human, professional, and ethical qualities.
- Other humanities courses place a strong emphasis on the legacy in politics, society, and culture.
- For all UG I students enrolled in curricula that raise awareness of global climate change and its effects on society, environmental studies is a required course. This course also emphasizes the sustainable use of natural resources and provides a brief overview of environmental components and degradation issues.
- Courses in ecology, ethnology, ecosystems, animal studies, and conservation tactics are offered in science faculties with the aim of raising environmental consciousness.
- Courses in industrial organic chemistry and environmental chemistry cover the responsible use of hazardous chemicals, polluting agents, and control strategies.

The integration of IT and reforms in examination procedures, including Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA), continues to significantly enhance the Examination Management System (EMS) of our institution. During this academic year, examinations were conducted offline for first, second, and third-year undergraduate courses, as well as first and second-year postgraduate courses. Odd semester examinations took place in Nov 2023, and even semester examinations were held in March 2024. The institution followed to the revised marking pattern of 60:40 for theory and 50:50 for practical assessments, as per the statute accepted and approved by the Governing Body and Academic Annual Quality Assurance Report of Sangameshwar College, Solapur.

The centralised examination unit of the institute organized examinations for 60% of the marks under the title SEE (Semester End Examination), while the remaining 40% marks, known as Continuous Assessment (CA), were conducted by individual departments for NEP Courses. For Non NEP COurses it is 70% SEE and 30% CA.Departments scheduled tests for respective courses.
